



PASTOR'S COLUMN

Spiritual pearls for youth and for all

The 31st World Youth Day events took place in Poland last week. Over 1.5 million pilgrims from over 180 countries participated with Pope Francis in prayer and celebrating the heritage of our Catholic faith. During his speeches and homilies the Holy Father imparted spiritual advice and wisdom to those participating. I listed here some of the ones that I felt would be something for each of us to ponder.

“Whoever welcomes Jesus, learns to love as Jesus does. So he asks us if we want a full life. And in his name, I ask you: do you want a full life? Start right this moment by letting yourself be open and attentive! Because happiness is sown and blossoms in mercy. That is his answer, his offer, his challenge, his adventure: mercy. Mercy always has a youthful face. Like that of Mary of Bethany, who sat as a disciple at the feet of Jesus and joyfully listened to his words, since she knew that there she would find peace. Like that of Mary of Nazareth, whose daring “Yes” launched her on the adventure of mercy. All generations would call her blessed; to all of us she is the “Mother of Mercy”. Let us call upon her together: Mary, Mother of Mercy. All of us: Mary, Mother of Mercy.” (*Welcoming Ceremony Address, Thursday, July 28, 2016*)

“How I would wish that we Christians could be as close to the sick as Jesus was, in silence, with a caress, with prayer. Sadly, our society is tainted by the culture of waste, which is the opposite of the culture of acceptance. And the victims of the culture of waste are those who are weakest and most frail; and this is indeed cruel. How beautiful it is instead to see that in this hospital the smallest and most needy are welcomed and cared for. Thank you for this sign of love that you offer us! This is the sign of true civility, human and Christian: to make those who are most disadvantaged the centre of social and political concern.” (*visit to the Children’s University Hospital, Krakow, Friday, July 29, 2016*)

“This is no time for denouncing anyone or fighting. We do not want to tear down, we do not want to give insult. We have no desire to conquer hatred with more hatred, violence with more violence, terror with more terror. We are here today because the Lord has called us together. Our response to a world at war has a name: its name is fraternity, its name is brotherhood, its name is communion, its name is family. We celebrate the fact that coming from different cultures, we have come together to pray. Let our best word, our best argument, be our unity in prayer. Let us take a moment of silence and pray. Let us place before the Lord these testimonies of our friends, and let us identify with those for whom “the family is a meaningless concept, the home only a place to sleep and eat”, and with those who live with the fear that their mistakes and sins have made them outcasts. Let us also place before the Lord your own “battles”, our “battles”, the interior struggles that each carries in his or her heart. And so, to live as a family, in fraternity, I invite all of you together to stand, to take each other’s hand and to pray in silence. All of us.” (*Prayer Vigil, Campus Misericordiae, Kraków*)

“That is our real “stature”, our spiritual identity: we are God’s beloved children, always. So you can see that not to accept ourselves, to live glumly, to be negative, means not to recognize our deepest identity. It is like walking away when God wants to look at me, trying to spoil his dream for me. God loves us the way we are, and no sin, fault or mistake of ours makes him change his mind. As far as Jesus is concerned – as the Gospel shows – no one is unworthy of, or far from, his thoughts. No one is insignificant. He loves all of us with a special love; for him all of us are important: *you* are important! God counts on you for what you are, not for what you possess. In his eyes the clothes you wear or the kind of cell phone you use are of absolutely no concern. He doesn’t care whether you are stylish or not; he cares about you, just as you are! In his eyes, you are precious, and your value is inestimable.”

“Dear young friends, don’t be ashamed to bring everything to the Lord in confession, especially your weaknesses, your struggles and your sins. He will surprise you with his forgiveness and his peace. Don’t be afraid to say “yes” to him with all your heart, to respond generously and to follow him! Don’t let your soul grow numb, but aim for the goal of a beautiful love which also demands sacrifice. Say a firm “no” to the narcotic of success at any cost and the sedative of worrying only about yourself and your own comfort.” (*Homily, Campus Misericordiae, Krakow*)

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL CEMETERY

The following are not permitted on cemetery grounds: artificial flowers, plastic or ceramic statues, vigil lights, trees, shrubs, ivy grave coverings and stands, metal legs or hooks for potted plants. Flowerbeds are permitted, running the width of a headstone and extending one foot off the monument base. Modest fencing of flowerbeds is allowed. Masonry or any other fencing around flower beds considered obtrusive or hazardous is not permitted. Maintenance of permitted plantings is the sole responsibility of the family. Any decorations, plantings or borders not permitted may be removed at any time. All rules subject to change upon consideration for the safety for those who visit and for aesthetic or religious reasons.

The rules above are posted in the cemetery and given to those who purchase plots. There are a number of situations in which the rules have been ignored. Trees and shrubs which have been planted will compromise foundations and eventually cause monuments to topple. As stated above masonry borders and fencing is prohibited. Both these infractions are potential safety hazards. In addition these violations interfere with the upkeep of the cemetery.

Therefore, beginning **October 1, 2016** we will be removing trees and shrubs from the cemetery and removing any permanent masonry flower bed borders. For those with plots in the cemetery you have the option of removing or transplanting trees and shrubs yourself prior to **October 1**. You also have the option of removing any permanent borders and replacing them in accordance with the rules stated. Your understanding and cooperation is appreciated as we strive to maintain our parish cemetery.

1ST-8TH GRADE CURRICULUM THEMES

St. Vincent de Paul's Faith Formation is a combination of classroom Family Faith events (described in last week's bulletin) and classroom sessions. There are a total of fourteen age-level classroom sessions that take place immediately after each Mass on Sunday beginning in October. Below is a detailed description of the curriculum. While children are in class, parents are welcome to attend an adult faith class or enjoy coffee and fellowship with other parents.

1 ST	GOD AS FATHER, SON & HOLY SPIRIT. SACRAMENTS.	Sacramental preparation is a two year program beginning in 1st grade and concluding in 2nd grade with First Penance and First Eucharist. <i>Book: Finding God - Loyola Press</i>
2 ND	FIRST PENANCE & FIRST EUCHARIST	First Holy Communion is in May. <i>Book: God's Gift Eucharist - Loyola Press</i>
3 RD	BIBLE	An introduction to the Bible and major people and exciting events of the Old Testament leading up to Jesus. <i>Book: Catholic Children's Bible - St. Mary's Press</i>
4 TH	CATHOLICISM *	*4 Themes of Catechism: 1. God (Father, Son, Holy Spirit) 2. Sacraments & Liturgy 3. Ten Commandments/Morality 4. Prayer <i>Book: Finding God - Loyola Press</i>
5 TH	CONSECRATION TO MARY	Mary, as the Mother of God, is the Queen of Heaven and earth and our greatest intercessor. Consecration means to give our hearts and concerns to Mary who will lead each of us to a deeper union with her son, Jesus. <i>Book: A Children's Consecration to Mary - Under Mary's Mantle</i>
6 TH	BIBLE	An overview of the Bible as God's plan to save us from sin and death and bring us to eternal life. The Old Testament is the history of God's Covenant with the Chosen people. <i>Book: Great People of the Bible - St. Mary's Press</i>
7 TH	CATHOLICISM*	Bishop Barron's "Catholicism Series" for Middle School
8 TH	THEOLOGY OF THE BODY	This curriculum is based on Saint Pope John Paul II's Theology of the Body and sheds a beautiful light on the dignity of each person as being made in the image and likeness of God. Family Faith: As a follow-up to the 6th/7th Grade Family Faith session on Theology of the Body, "Made in God's Image", this year (on Nov.13), 8th Graders and their parents will attend a session that presents a deeper level of Theology of the Body. In light of Saint Pope John Paul II's writings, the "whys" behind the Church's beautiful teachings on chastity and the importance of "waiting" until marriage will be explained and discussed as a family and community. <i>Book: Theology of the Body for Teens - Ascension Press</i>
